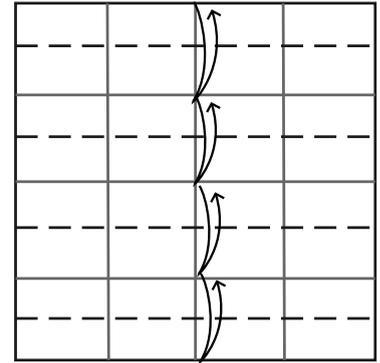
A simple and quick boxpleat model. The slit near the front legs can be removed for a more realistic approach but it was left there for aesthetic reasons. Use of duo color paper with a medium thickness is recommended.



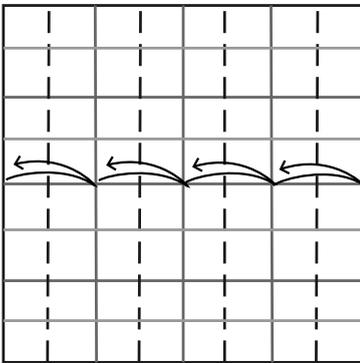
1. White side up. Fold and unfold in half.



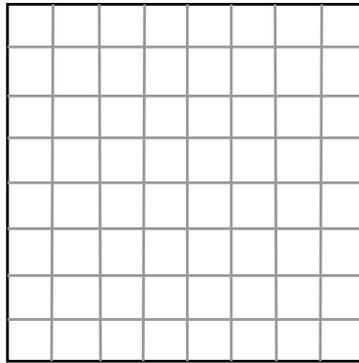
2. Fold and unfold to the center.



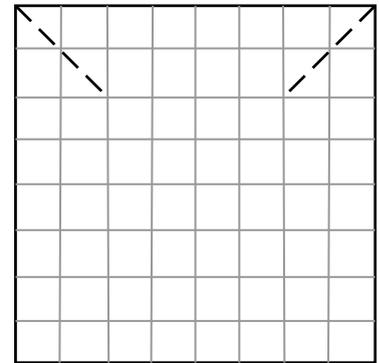
3. Divide each section in half.



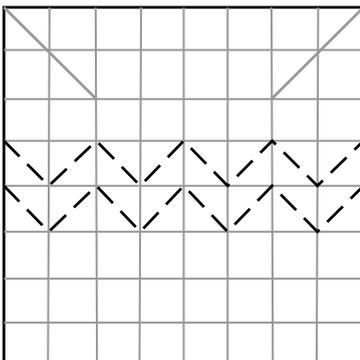

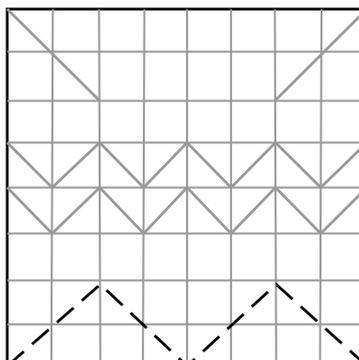
5. Completed 8x8 grid.



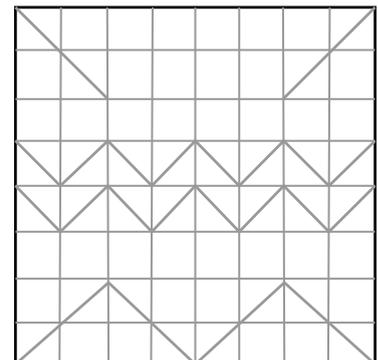

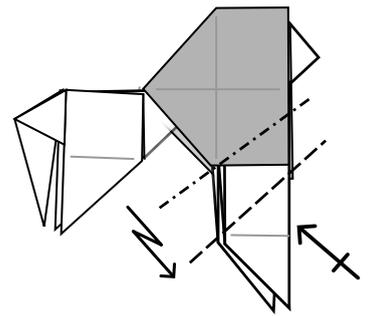
24. Fold inward along the angle bisector on both sides.



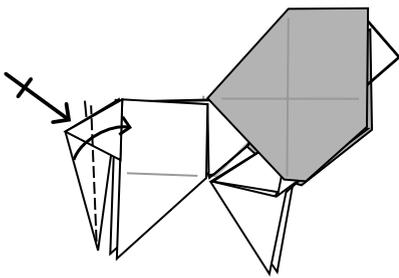
25. Inside reverse fold.



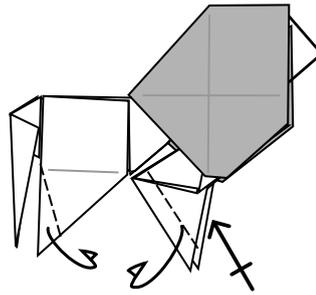
26. Inside reverse fold the inner layer to create the head.



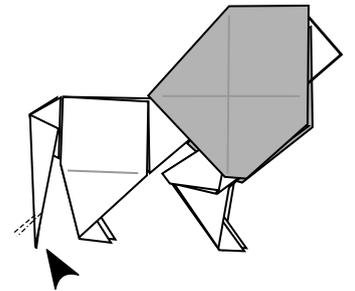
27. Pleat fold the legs. Repeat behind.



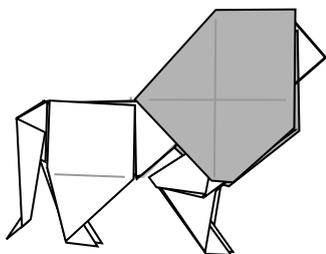
28. Fold the tail in half. Repeat behind
